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According to William Kentridge, "The Rebus sculptures [are] as hieroglyphs, placed in a line like a line of letters or words or syllables which can be rearranged to make new sentences." The project started out as a collection of drawings portraying how images are able to transform. The practice was then extended to cardboard cut-outs and then into three dimensional cardboard sculptures.

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
